Visual Schedules

Children may struggle when they don't know what to expect in their day.

Using a visual schedule can help.

What is a visual schedule?

Visual schedules are a series of pictures or words that show a sequence of activities or tasks. Using visual aids is an evidence based practice for working with kids with developmental disabilities.

Why are visual schedules helpful?

Studies show that including visuals, such as pictures, photos, or icons, can help many kids with developmental disabilities, like autism, process information better.

Should visual schedules be used with individual students or the whole group?

The answer is yes and yes. Visual schedules can be made just for individual kids, and used at home or at church. But, if you are in a classroom setting, know that using a visual schedule with the whole class can help everyone, especially younger students!

What is the best way to use a visual schedule?

Refer to the visual schedule each time you move to a different activity. You can use simple language with students while pointing to the visual schedule. For example: "we just finished music, and now we are going to read a Bible story." Consistently using the visual schedule with your students can be an easy way to reduce their stress and make changing activities easier for everyone.
